The Football Foundation is the country's largest sports charity.

Launched in July 2000, it is funded by the Premier League, The FA and Government and directs £40m every year into grass roots sport.

Foundation funding is transforming this country's community sports infrastructure. It is driving up participation in sport by building or refurbishing facilities whilst also targeting traditionally under served groups and communities.

The Foundation also funds community programmes that use the persuasive power of sport to address some of society's key challenges, in areas such as social inclusion, health, education and equalities, working in some of the most deprived areas of the country. The Foundation invests at least 40% of its funds into the 20% most deprived wards in the country.

The Foundation has effectively doubled its investment into the grass roots by leveraging additional partnership funding at both national and local levels. Since 2000, the Foundation has supported over 7,000 projects worth almost £900m, of which over half has been levered in from other sources.

The Foundation is a proven lean, effective and efficient delivery vehicle for the distribution of funding to where it is most needed in support of those who play football and sport simply for the love of doing so, or who use sport to create safer and more inclusive communities.

CHIEF EXECUTIVE'S FOREWORD

As we look forward to our tenth anniversary, everyone associated with the Foundation can look back with immense satisfaction at the considerable impact our efforts have had in support of grass roots sport and building safer and more cohesive communities. The amazing collection of photographs contained in this Review show what a busy and impactful year we have had.

As a 'performance' organisation, the Foundation is proud of its ability to distribute charitable funds, manage programmes and projects and provide evidence of impact. Many of our achievements are detailed by region in the following pages, and during the past year we have seen yet another considerable year-on-year increase in football and multi-sport participation on Foundation-funded facilities, whilst the community projects we have funded continue to make a huge difference to thousands and thousands of people's lives.

Our achievements against our strategic key performance indicators were: an overall 9.8% year-on-year increase in participation on the facilities we have funded; more than half our sites included sports activity other than football; and over half of our overall investment was made in the 20% most deprived areas in the country.

This year we launched the Foundation's first ever Diversity Strategy at an event in Parliament attended by Minister for Sport Gerry Sutcliffe, Shadow Minister for Sport Hugh Robertson, and Liberal Democrat Shadow Culture, Media and Sport Secretary Don Foster. This strategy now underpins all of our processes and helps to ensure our grant making process is transparent and equitable.

I am also proud to say we continue to manage some significant Corporate Social Responsibility programmes including the Premier League and PFA Community Fund which will invest some £12.9m into some truly innovative schemes over the three years 2007 to 2010.

I would like to thank our funding partners, the Premier League, The FA and the Government for their continued encouragement and support for everything we do, and of course for the vital funding they provide, without which none of the achievements that appear in this Review would be possible.

The Foundation will commemorate its tenth anniversary in July 2010, and the whole organisation looks forward to celebrating this with our partners and supporters. In the meantime, we will continue to approach everything we do with endeavour, creativity and clarity of purpose, and always with an eye to continuous improvement and value for money.

WHY THE FOOTBALL FOUNDATION

We have taken...

Investment

The £373m that has been provided by the Premier League, The FA and the Government since 2000, and £57m provided by corporate partners such as Barclays, and then more than doubled this investment through matched funding from local and national partners.

Unmet demand

Almost 1.4m adults would like to start playing (or play more) football. (Active People Survey 2, 2007).

An estimated one million children who want to play football but can't (FA participation survey).

Expertise

An experienced in-house team with industry-leading expertise in:

- Using football and sport for community benefit
- Facility design and delivery
- Environmental sustainability
- Business and project performance management.

And turned it into...

Sports facilities

Facilities, which almost 600,000 people use week-in week-out.

- 310 artificial grass pitches, all with floodlights
- 374 grass pitch projects
- 624 changing rooms.

Approximately 40% of this investment has been in the 20% most deprived communities.

Activities

Over 600 Community projects for over 330,000 people, predominantly young people; approximately 70% live in the most deprived communities in the country.

Football development grants to create <u>new</u> teams for 59,000 people to play football through the Grow the Game scheme.

Kit

Free football kits for over 250,000 young boys and girls, or people with a disability.

MEANS BUSINESS...

Which in turn delivers...

Healthier people

Sport can:

- Increase physical activity, which is widely proven to reduce obesity rates, and the associated risk of coronary heart disease, diabetes, stroke, high blood pressure, some cancers, as well as mental health issues.
- Help to reduce current and future NHS cost, with an estimated cost of physical inactivity of least £1 bn per year (Oxford University, 2007), which is likely to rise significantly in line with obesity rates.

The Foundation has:

- Funded projects for over 900,000 people carrying out regular physical activity through our Facilities and Community projects, over half of whom live in the most health-deprived areas of the country.
- Funded many projects that aim specifically at improving people's health through both education and increased physical activity, delivered directly to targeted high-risk groups.

Case study: The London and Quadrant Housing Trust was awarded $\pounds 110,259$ by the Foundation to increase physical activity, improve diet and change the behaviour of overweight and obese children and their families. It is envisaged that over 100 children will adopt a long-term healthy lifestyle as a consequence of the scheme, as well as reduce their waist size by an average of 2cm.

Safer communities

Sport can:

- Contribute towards reducing the re-offending rate, which is currently over two thirds of offenders within two years of release from prison.
- Contribute towards reducing crime and the associated cost of crime, with custody alone costing over £35,000 per person, per year.

The Foundation has:

- Engaged over 330,000 people in positive activities through Community projects; around 230,000 of whom have been from the most socially deprived areas in the country.
- Funded many projects, such as Kickz and the Second Chance Programme, which actively seek to reduce incidences of crime and anti-social behaviour.

Case study: The Second Chance Programme was awarded £153,500 by the Foundation to work with young offenders housed in Portland Young Offenders Institute (YOI). Nationally, two-thirds of young offenders re-offend within two years of release; in the pilot programme, based at YOI Ashfield, only 4% of participants re-offended.

People with a brighter future

Sport can:

- Enhance self esteem and help to improve social skills.
- Help boost employment; approximately 1.8% of the country's employment is in the sports industry.

The Foundation has:

- Funded projects that have allowed over 70,000 people to take part in personal development through accredited coaching courses, resulting in 41,500 new qualified sports coaches.
- Funded projects that help people aquire the skills to gain employment. Over 10,000 people have gained employment following participation in a Foundation scheme.

Case study: The Foundation provided a grant of £249,500 towards a National Workforce Development project, to provide participants with accredited and vocationally recognised training. By the end of 2010 it is envisaged that the programme will have delivered over 5,000 qualifications that will in turn provide a community sport workforce with the skills needed to engage communities, effectively deliver programmes safely and have an impact on a range of social issues.

And numerous other positive effects, including a safer, more integrated society and improved educational attainment.

Summary Trustees' Report

These summarised financial statements do not contain sufficient information to allow for a full understanding of the financial affairs of the Football Foundation. The Football Foundation's objects are to promote all purposes recognised as charitable under the law of England and Wales in particular through an association with sport. During the year grants were awarded to organisations and bodies to improve or create new pitches and changing facilities in parks and schools. Grants were also awarded to assist in the development of communities and the people who share them, including encouraging physical activity, drug awareness courses, anti-racism activities and the development of numeracy and literacy schemes. The Football Foundation intends to maintain its current grant making activity over these categories. No trustee received any remuneration from the Football Foundation during the year.

The full annual financial statements, from which these summary financial statements are derived and on which the Auditors gave an unqualified opinion, were approved by the Trustees on 17 September 2009, and have been delivered to the Charity Commission and to the Registrar of Companies.
